## **Greetings from the Chair**

### Dear Alumni and Friends:

The Department of Philosophy is gearing up for the start of another exciting academic year! Let me take a minute to update you on some of the great things the department accomplished since our last newsletter and preview some of the things we hope to accomplish this academic year.

The philosophy faculty have been very active and very successful this year. Several members of the department were recently promoted: Dr. Eric Godoy was granted tenure and promoted to associate professor, Dr. Daniel Breyer was promoted to full professor, and Dr. Alison Bailey was named University Professor-this is one of the highest honors the University bestows on a faculty member for truly exceptional research and teaching. Dr. Christopher Horvath was appointed to a second five-year term as department chair. In light of the anticipated retirement of Dr. Alison Bailey in December 2024, the Department of Philosophy worked with the African American Studies program to successfully hire a new faculty member with expertise in philosophy of race. Dr. John Lawless joined the department as an assistant professor in fall 2023 with a joint appointment in philosophy and African American Studies. In addition to teaching our courses in Philosophy of Law, Dr. Lawless will develop and teach philosophy courses that serve as elective options within the African American

Studies minor. Finally, Dr. Derek O'Connell, the department's academic advisor and assistant to the chair, was recently awarded the College of Arts and Science Excellence Award for Outstanding Service by a member of the Administrative Professional Staff.

Starting in fall 2023, the department undertook a comprehensive examination of our current curriculum. The committee collected and considered data on enrollment trends, student success measures such as retention and time to degree, trends in faculty teaching assignments, comparisons with comparator and aspirational programs, and changes within the discipline. The department curriculum committee proposed substantive revisions to the curriculum of the philosophy major. Our goals were to make the curriculum more inclusive, decrease barriers to timely completion of the degree, and spread teaching of core courses in the major among more members of the faculty. We will resume discussions of this curriculum proposal in August and plan to reach final decisions about any revisions before the end of November.

A total of 17 students have graduated with a bachelor's degree in philosophy since our last newsletter. The names of all recent graduates are listed elsewhere in this newsletter. On behalf of the department, let me wish each of these graduates a hearty congratulations! Welcome to the ranks of our honored alumni! Speaking of honored alumni—check out what's happening with our graduates in the "Alumni Updates" section elsewhere in this newsletter. In April 2023 and again in April 2024, the Department of Philosophy Scholarship Committee nominated students for the Scott M. Elliott Outstanding New Philosophy Student Scholarship, the Scott M. Elliott Outstanding Continuing Philosophy Student Scholarship, and the Kenneth and Marilyn Kennard Outstanding Graduating Student Scholarship. The faculty selected winners of each of these scholarships, and the winners were announced and recognized at our annual awards ceremony and banquet held the week before spring commencement. During the banquet, we also recognized the winners of the Scott M. Elliott Essay Prize in Philosophy. You can find a list of all the scholarship winners elsewhere in this newsletter. Congratulations to all our scholarship recipients!

At the suggestion from some members of the faculty, the department created a new departmental scholarship: "The Department of Philosophy Leadership Award." Each year, we will award a \$250 scholarship that recognizes a philosophy major for excellence in leadership and involvement. This award will be given to a student each year who has: inspired success, engagement, and a sense of belonging in philosophy students; made meaningful contributions to the department in a way that impacts philosophy students; and/or demonstrated initiative in seeking ways to enrich the experience of philosophy students. The Leadership Award will be funded by the Department of Philosophy Excellence Fund.

Over the last year, the department has helped bring local chapters of two national philosophy student organizations to Illinois State. At the request of some of the students in our major and working with those students, we submitted a petition to create a chapter of Phi Sigma Tau, International Honors Society in Philosophy. Our petition was approved in fall 2023, and the Illinois Upsilon Chapter was officially installed here at Illinois State. # **Faculty Updates**



Dr. John Lawless

Dr. John Lawless joined the department in August 2024 as an assistant professor with a joint appointment in African American Studies. Professor Lawless earned his Ph.D. in philosophy at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, in 2016. Since then, he has held positions at the University of Pittsburgh, Davidson College, and most recently, Utica University in Central New York. In his research, he explores the relationship between freedom and the rule of law, and the ways in which racist ideologies rationalize serious departures from the rule of law. His current book project focuses specifically on the processes by which people negotiate

racial boundaries in racist communities and on the ways in which these negotiations empower white elites to prevent multi-racial alliances from coalescing in opposition to existing power structures. At Illinois State, Dr. Lawless will teach classes in the philosophy of law and will develop new courses in the philosophy of race in collaboration with the African American Studies program.

It is with great appreciation and admiration that we announce the retirement of University Professor and Director of the Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGSS) program, Dr. Alison Bailey, at the end of the fall 2024 semester. With 31 years of dedication to the Department of Philosophy and 20 years at the helm of the WGSS program, Dr. Bailey leaves behind a legacy of outstanding scholarship, service, and leadership at Illinois State University. A retirement reception has been planned in Dr. Bailey's honor to celebrate her time at Illinois State. The reception took place on November 15 at University Galleries.

### Faculty Scholarship Update

### AI and the Humanities: An Interdisciplinary Symposium

Generative artificial intelligence (AI), large language processing models, advanced analytics, reinforced and unsupervised machine learning, predictive prose. Humanist scholars and educators outside of computer science, mathematics, engineering, and cognitive science are now versed in the terminology of AI, but conversations about the potential epistemological, ethical, existential, and pedagogical impact of technologies of human behavior simulation are still young. The Department of Philosophy, along with the Department of English, the Department of Language, Literatures, and Cultures, the School of Communication, and the Women's, Gender, and Sexualities Studies Program will co-host an international symposium on AI and the humanities in April 2025. The AI and the Humanities Symposium is a unique opportunity to foster discussion among scholars, teachers, and students from around the world and across disciplines of the humanities, arts, and connected social sciences. The symposium will be held at Illinois State April 16-18, 2025. Calls for proposals and invitations to keynote speakers went out in August 2024. ### Bailey Invited to Present Anti-Racist Scholarship at Arcadia University

Dr. Alison Bailey was invited to give a series of lectures at Arcadia University on her recent book *The Weight of Whiteness: A Feminist Engagement with Privilege, Race, and Ignorance.* Her visit was sponsored by the Center for Anti-Racist Scholarship, Advocacy and Action (CASAA) and included a lecture to the university community and general public on White Talk, Privilege, and Ignorance—which she argues "is designed, indeed scripted, for the purposes of evading, rejecting, and remaining ignorant about the injustices that flow from whiteness and its attendant privileges"—as well as on privilege and ignorance. The day concluded with a panel discussion on "The Work of Antiracism: Approaches and Barriers," after which Dr. Bailey was presented with the firstever CASAA Award for Galvanizing Change.

### **Student Awards**

Every year the department offers three different scholarships for outstanding philosophy majors: The Scott M. Elliott Outstanding New Philosophy Student Scholarship, the Scott M. Elliott Outstanding Continuing Philosophy Student Scholarship, the Kenneth and the Marilyn Kennard Outstanding Graduating Students Scholarship. The Department of Philosophy Scholarship Committee nominates eligible students for each of these scholarships, and the faculty selects the winner. In especially strong years, more than one winner for an individual award may be chosen. In addition, each spring, students are invited to submit their work for the Scott M. Elliott Essay Prize in Philosophy. The Department of Philosophy Scholarship Committee reviews the submissions and selects a winner.



## **Student Updates**

### New Peer Mentoring Program in Philosophy

The department received a Provost Innovation and Enhancement Grant (funded by the College of Arts and Sciences) for \$3,072 in Fiscal Year 2023 to create the Peer Mentoring Program in Philosophy. Dr. Daniel Breyer serves as director of this mentorship program. Over the summer of 2023, he created a comprehensive and intensive training program for mentors and recruited four outstanding students to serve as peer mentors in the inaugural year of the program. The official purpose of the Peer Mentor Program is to provide students taking philosophy courses with the chance to meet one-on-one or in small groups with peer mentors who have been trained to help them cultivate and refine the fundamental skills needed to read and write philosophy. But those are not the only goals of the Peer Mentorship Program! It is also about helping students—including the mentors themselves—become self-confident learners, while ideally fostering a sense of belonging in the Philosophy Department.

The following students serve as peer mentors: Sneh Vora, Sara O'Dowd, Michael Bloomfield, Robert Reckamp, and William Restis (2023-24). We plan to continue this program using resources from the Department of Philosophy Excellence Fund.



# **Undergraduate Philosophy Research**

Illinois State hosts an annual University Research Symposium each April. The symposium is an opportunity for undergraduate students to present their own independent scholarship done under the mentorship of a faculty member. Since our last newsletter, two philosophy students have presented posters summarizing their research.



In 2023, Sara O'Dowd presented a research poster titled "The Ethos of Absence." Her study explores the role of silence and physical absence as tools of rhetoric. Silence and absence have become increasingly important rhetorical tools, especially in the hands of those on the political margins. O'Dowd based her analysis on Aristotle's model of rhetoric. Dr. Daniel Breyer served as her faculty mentor.



At the 2024 University Research Symposium, Robert Reckamp presented, "Plato and Time—Can Time Exist Without the Material World?" His research compared the views of two different modern scholars, Thomas Seissl and David Guetter, on Plato's understanding of time as discussed in the *Timaeus*. Dr. Daniel Breyer served as faculty mentor for this project.
